

WORD

(sit) FIRST READING

Deuteronomy 4:1-2, 6-9

The name of this book means a "second" (like the word, duet) "giving of the law" (like our words such as astronomy, economy). The Old Testament is the story of God's work to restore creation: A chosen people (Genesis 12:3) who are rescued from slavery and given a bountiful land. But how will they use freedom and prosperity? Will they use laws to build up the common good or to divide and exclude? Verse 2 says "... neither add anything ... nor take anything away from it." How is society handling that? How is the Church handling that? How do I handle that? How does Jesus's summary of the Law in Mark 12:29-31 help us?

So now, Israel, give heed to the statutes and ordinances that I am teaching you to observe, so that you may live to enter and occupy the land that the Lord, the God of your ancestors, is giving you. ²You must neither add anything to what I command you nor take away anything from it, but keep the commandments of the Lord your God with which I am charging you.

⁶You must observe them diligently, for this will show your wisdom and discernment to the peoples, who, when they hear all these statutes, will say, "Surely this great nation is a wise and discerning people!" ⁷For what other great nation has a god so near to it as the Lord our God is whenever we call to him? ⁸And what other great nation has statutes and ordinances as just as this entire law that I am setting before you today? ⁹But take care and watch yourselves closely, so as neither to forget the things that your eyes have seen nor to let them slip from your mind all the days of your life; make them known to your children and your children's children.

PSALM 15:1-5(read responsively)

¹LORD, who may dwell in your tabernacle?

²Those who lead a blameless life and do what is right,

who speak the truth from their heart;

⁴In their sight the wicked are rejected, but they honor those who fear the LORD.

⁵They do not give their money in hope of gain, nor do they take bribes against the innocent. Those who do these things shall never be overthrown.

SECOND READING James 1:17-21

Tradition attributes this letter to the brother of Jesus. However, we are not sure which, of several early Church leaders by that name, is the author. See Matthew 13:55; Acts 12:1; 15:13. In this letter we do not read much about who Jesus is or what God was doing through Jesus. We do read a lot, however, about what we are to be doing – and not doing – if we claim to be a follower of Jesus.

Every generous act of giving, with every perfect gift, is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change. ¹⁸In fulfillment of his own purpose he gave us birth by the word of truth, so that we would become a kind of first fruits of his creatures. ¹⁹You must understand this, my beloved: let everyone be quick to listen, slow to speak, slow to anger; ²⁰for your anger does not produce God's righteousness. ²¹Therefore rid yourselves of all sordidness and rank growth of wickedness, and welcome with meekness the implanted word that has the power to save your souls. ²²But be doers of the word, and not merely hearers who deceive themselves. ²³For if any are hearers of the word and not doers, they are like those who look at themselves in a mirror; ²⁴for they look at themselves and, on going away, immediately forget what they were like. ²⁵But those who look into the perfect law, the law of liberty, and persevere, being not hearers who forget but doers who act—they will be blessed in their doing. ²⁶If any think they are religious, and do not bridle their tongues but deceive their hearts, their religion is worthless. ²⁷Religion that is pure and undefiled before God, the Father, is this: to care for orphans and widows in their distress, and to keep oneself unstained by the world.

THE HOLY GOSPEL

Mark 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23

What would Jesus do? That is a good question. Yet finding a helpful answer may not always be easy? What would Jesus do when the traffic light turns yellow? Detailed regulations can be helpful. When, however, we use such "laws" to judge unfairly, then we miss the God-given purpose for rules and regulations. Jesus may be suggesting that somehow the connection between the "head" and the "hands" goes through the "heart." Our understanding of physical anatomy may not help us here as much as trying to learn what the Creator God meant in saying, "Let us make humankind in our image" [Genesis 1:26].

Now when the Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered around [Jesus], ²they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with defiled hands, that is, without washing them. ³(For the Pharisees, and all the Jews, do not eat unless they thoroughly wash their hands, thus observing the tradition of the elders; ⁴and they do not eat anything from the market unless they wash it; and there are also many other traditions that they observe, the washing of cups, pots, and bronze kettles.) ⁵So the Pharisees and the scribes asked him, "Why do your disciples not live according to the tradition of the elders, but eat with defiled hands?" ⁶He said to them, "Isaiah prophesied rightly about you hypocrites, as it is written, 'This people honors me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me; ⁷in vain do they worship me, teaching human precepts as doctrines.' ⁸You abandon the commandment of God and hold to human tradition."

¹⁴Then he called the crowd again and said to them, "Listen to me, all of you, and understand: ¹⁵there is nothing outside a person that by going in can defile, but the things that come out are what defile."

²¹For it is from within, from the human heart, that evil intentions come: fornication, theft, murder, ²²adultery, avarice, wickedness, deceit, licentiousness, envy, slander, pride, folly. ²³All these evil things come from within, and they defile a person."

Today's offertory was written by the late Dr. Alan Brandes, former music professor at Dana College. Dr. Brandes was Mr. Jones' private piano teacher in junior high, high school, and college. The work is constructed as a chorale prelude, a common form of composition in the Baroque period in which original material is interspersed between and over the phrases of the hymn tune melody. Every hymn in the hymnal has a "hymn tune name" which you can see at the bottom on the page. "Old Hundreth" is the hymn tune most commonly known as the Doxology.





Deuteronomy 4:8 (NRSV)

A Prayer for the Week:

Lord, help us to hear your message of salvation in a way that leads us to act with justice and mercy. Amen.

Mealtime Prayer:

Plates of food, gifts from above, signs of our God's gracious love. Amen.

A Blessing to Give:

May the God who gave you birth by the word of truth give you peace and good courage. (James 1:18)

Discuss in your home or small group:

- Why is it important to follow rules?
- What do you like about God's rules?
- In Deuteronomy 4:7-8, God's rules show the greatness of God and the justice of God to all the world. What is it about God that you want to tell the world?

Read: Deuteronomy 4:1-2, 6-9.

The God of Israel ruled with justice, mercy, and reliability that foreign gods lacked. The challenge of Israel was not to forget the God of Israel and the ways of God. This challenge carried with it the need to tell the children and future generations what the people had experienced and learned through the goodness and justice of God (v. 9). How does following Jesus help you live with God's justice and mercy? How do you make the goodness and mercy of God known to others—to your friends and family and others that you work and play with?

Pray: Dear God, your justice and mercy is filled with care for all. Thank you for caring for us and guiding us in kindness for others. Help us to tell of your goodness to those around us and to generations yet unborn. In Jesus' name. Amen.

In James 1:17-26 being "doers of the word" implies a meekness that is not prideful. Instead, it acts with mercy that includes caring for "orphans and widows in their distress" (v. 27). Orphans and widows represented those who were vulnerable and did not have a social safety net to keep them fed, sheltered, and safe. Think of those locally and around the world who lack security of food and shelter. Make a financial commitment to an organization that helps these people or contribute your time and talents to work on behalf of the hungry and homeless.

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS

In Mark 7:1-23, discipline shapes the soul. Ordinances mentioned in Deuteronomy 4:1 promote a way of life that includes rituals and traditions. These ordinances—these rituals and traditions—help remind us of the goodness of God. Rituals and traditions have often lost their appeal because they have become disconnected from the grace of God that helps us live with others in peace and hope. It is important to practice the Christian faith in a way that connects the message of God's love with our daily lives. Giving a blessing, offering a mealtime prayer, reading the Bible, and daily prayers, including the Lord's Prayer, are all valuable ways to discipline our lives in hope and faith. Look at this week's *Taking Faith Home* and identify faith practices you will commit to doing this week. Consider making these practices part of your routine to guide and encourage your life of faith.
