Advent 2024 - Cultivating Hope

This year our Advent theme is Cultivating Hope, so let's take a moment and think about what hope is, and what it's not. My own understanding of hope has transformed quite a bit over the years of my adulthood. Two things in particular have ...complicated... the idea of hope in my mind and, in doing so, I think deepened and broadened how I think about hope. First is being a foster parent. Because kids in foster care have been able to show and tell me a truth about hope that I knew but had never been brave enough to put words to – hope is incredibly frightening, because hope makes you vulnerable. The temptation, then, for people who have

had hope many times and been bitterly disappointed, is to stop hoping altogether. And sometimes we might rationalize such an approach as better preparing us for the hard realities of life. But

the truth is, avoiding hope doesn't protect us the way we might, well, hope. Sociologist and author Brené Brown describes this poignantly in a story from her book Daring Greatly:

"A man in his early sixties told me, "I used to think the best way to go through life was to expect the worst. That way, if it happened, you were prepared, and if it didn't happen, you were pleasantly surprised. Then I was in a car accident and my wife was killed. Needless to say, expecting the worst didn't prepare me at all. And worse, I still grieve for all of those wonderful moments we shared and that I didn't fully enjoy. My commitment to her is to fully enjoy every moment now. I just wish she was here, now that I know how to do that."

The second group of people who have helped me think differently about hope are Black authors, activists, and friends who have been transparently honest about their own complicated relationship with this dynamic of hope

and disappointment. Black Christian writer and speaker Austin Channing Brown titled the last chapter of her book I'm Still Here "Standing in the Shadow of Hope". She reflects on the pushback that Ta-Nehisi Coates got, after his landmark memoir Between the World and Me was published, that he was being too cynical, too hopeless, and it was unhelpful to his cause. She pushes back in return, describing the way "hope for me has died one thousand deaths... I had hoped... but hope died." She repeats that truth over and over - I had hope... but hope died describing so many things she has hoped for, only to be disappointed. Do you hear some echoes of Scripture in this? "I had hoped... but hope died" said the disciples on the road to Emmaus in the aftermath of Jesus' crucifixion. "I had hoped... but hope died" Mary might have thought as she stood at the foot of Jesus' cross. "I had hoped... but hope died" is a faithful and transparently honest reflection of life in this world. "So," writes Channing Brown, "I have **learned not to fear the death of hope.** ... What is left

when the source of my hope has failed? Each death of hope has been painful and costly. But in the mourning there always rises a new clarity about the world, about

the Church, about myself, about God. And in this there is new life.... And on the really good days, renewal."

I am in a content place in my own life at the moment – although, if I'm honest, perhaps that contentment is more exhausted resignation and simply going through the motions! I remember the first year of the pandemic – when professional and personal life both felt overwhelmingly hard. Hope died a thousand deaths for me in 2020. And slowly I learned to let it die – each time pointing me to a new and richer hope. Because the things that I long for in the depths of my heart aren't wrong hopes: I long for every person – every child, every friend, every stranger – to have the safety, dignity and love they deserve; I long for the end of violence, hunger, cold-hearted distain, destruction of our planet; I long for my own sense of meaning and purpose – to live a life that honors my neighbors and glorifies God, and to escape the petty sins that I can't seem to shake. And

Worship Times


Holy Communion is offered weekly at all three weekend liturgies which use resources from Evangelical Lutheran Worship:

Worship with us on TV or via Internet Livestream




Our 9:00 AM worship service is broadcast live on television every Sunday on Cox Channel 13. You can also livestream the service right from your computer on our church

NEWS & Notes...



Tina Broekemeier, vice president, called the meeting to order at 6:00 PM.

Jerry Fischer led devotions.

The meeting agenda was accepted.

The minutes from September 17, 2024, were approved.

The Council reviewed the committees and boards by Ministry area that Pastor Lucy provided. Following a brief discussion Council members volunteered for the various committees as follows: Steve Hinrichs Council representative to the property committee; Tim Backora Council representative to the Scholarship Committee; Kate McCoy Council representative to the Endowment Fund Board; Jennifer Bunge Council representative on the KETV Board; and Ruth Henneman Council representative to the Stewardship Committee.

Tim Backora provided an update on the unspent funds' proposal. The Finance Committee has written and nearly completed the forms that will allow the areas of Worship, Faith Formation, Community Engagement, Membership, and Facilities to apply for seed money (up to \$14,000) to try new ideas to improve and grow the church.

Once the request forms are completed and returned to the Finance Committee, the Council will be asked to approve the funding. After the proposal(s) are completed and the seed money spent, a report on the outcome of each project is to be submitted to the Council. This information will also be shared with the congregation in the church's annual report.

The staffing consultation report from Martin Malley was discussed. Some of the areas discussed were the need for more volunteers in most areas and the need for a more formalized method of assessing volunteer workloads.

Coaches to mentor and provide continual support to graduates, helping them to achieve their personal goals by connecting them to necessary resources. To help support this collaboration, Kountze Memorial Lutheran Church's Alternative Gifts program is adding two items to its Christmas list:

- Books or Supplies for an Omaha Bridges class participant at \$25.00.
- Salary of a Mentor to support an Omaha Bridges class participant at \$83.00.

The need for cross-training of staff members was also discussed. Specific areas of discussion were the positions of office manager and facilities manager. The Council recognizes that efforts in these areas are critical for going forward, but it is not an easy task given the vast knowledge and skills these two individuals possess. This will be an ongoing cooperative effort. It is anticipated that the staffing consultation recommendations will be discussed again in the future as the need arises.

The Stewardship Report (Jennifer and Mattie) is an ongoing process and will be updated at an upcoming meeting.

New Business. Tim Backora reported that budget planning for 2025 is in the early stages. It is anticipated to become intense soon as the various committees are queried regarding budget requests and possible future needs. The process is labor intensive and will take time. This is also the time to relabel account names to ensure they align with the budget items in specific accounts as the switch is made to the software program, Realm Church Management. The annual budget will require a considerable amount of time and work.

Tim Backora detailed the financial report for September. September was not a particularly good month financially. For the year through September, the church had budgeted \$790,000 but has only received \$719,000. We still have three months to catch up. There was a brief discussion regarding the deficit. A suggestion was made to use a graph (such as a thermometer) in the monthly bulletin to show the congregation our financial situation. This is being considered. It was also mentioned that \$22,000 is required per week for the church to operate.

Staff reports were reviewed and accepted.

There were seven new members in the last membership class.

Other Council announcements included:

- The next archives presentation will be on Sunday, November 10, 2024.
- A Thanksgiving Community Worship service is being hosted by Kountze on November 24, 2024, at 6:00 PM. This service will require volunteers such as ushers, etc. Volunteer sign-up sheets are being developed. Also, security will be provided at this service.
- Once again Kountze and St. Peter Catholic Church are co-hosting a Thanksgiving dinner at St. Peter's. Tuesday PM the prepping of the turkeys will take place at Kountze and the cooking of the turkeys will be organized. Further details will be announced. The carving of the turkeys will occur at St. Peter's this year.

Omaha Streetcar Update from Jim



As work on the Omaha Streetcar is increasing, we will try to keep you updated as best as possible of upcoming closures to Farnam St. and areas surrounding the church.

Currently, Farnam St. is reduced to one lane at the Interstate 480 bridge. M.U.D. is relocating natural gas pipelines in the area. This work is scheduled to continue into December baring any unplanned delays.

The parking meters in front of the church along Farnam St. are still available for use and you will still need to pay at the meters. In the future there may be times that the parking at the meters will not be allowed during some of the construction, (if the meters have RED bags on them stating no parking, then please do not park there).

The City and Streetcar Authority have assured us that they will try and minimize the impact and keep the Farnam St. access to our West parking lot open as much as they can. There may be some minor closures to that entrance once work progresses. None of the construction should impact the Douglas St. entrance to the West parking lot.

The biggest impact will probably be the bridge replacements (First Harney St. then the Farnam St. bridge). Each bridge is expected to take a year to complete. We do not have a timeline on when the bridge replacements will begin - but soon.

But instead of abandoning hope, we cultivate it – deepen it, asking God to renew our hope over and over again when it is disappointed. Because in doing so we lift our eyes up to the One who is, who was, and who

is to come – the only One who offers us true Hope, true Salvation.

So wherever you are in life this December, I invite you to join us in Cultivating Hope – not in a falsely optimistic way, but in being transparently honest about our deepest hopes and deepest disappointments. Turning our hearts together towards the One who is our only Hope.



Kountze Memorial will join other high school youth and leaders from around the Nebraska Synod


