February is the "Love" month, the month of Valentine's Day, so I thought we might delve a little into the Synod's year-long theme that was launched at Synod Assembly in June 2024: Cultivating Love. Each month you may notice in our newsletters and bulletins this focus fleshed out in different ways we can cultivate love. But the more I thought about it, the more I wanted to highlight one NOT covered – Cultivating Love through... Slowness. Deliberate, intentional slowness.

My January newsletter article started with the confession, "My brain is like my computer's internet web browser – there are always a few dozen tabs open and some of them are making noise!" So know that my theme this month (as is frequently the case) is aimed particularly at ME. I know deep in my bones that love is more than emotion, more than affection or passion or what I often call in wedding sermons "warm fuzzy feelings". Love is an action word – it's behaviors, choices we make with our time, our abilities and efforts, our words, our money. And acts of love often nurture those warm fuzzy feelings. But one thing I learned in my 20's – and have had to keep relearning since – is that one of the biggest obstacles to love is my own expectations. And especially my expectations about how fast things can and should happen.

We live in such a busy, busy society and world. I think we all recognize the way our society, largely with the Technological Revolution, has shifted to a 24-7 mentality that often expects immediacy, or as close to it as we can get. No longer do we have to check our messages on the answering machine when we get home – our phones are always with us. Some of us are available almost 24-7 for certain people and things in our lives. And while there are some great conveniences, there are some incredible costs as well. We are an exhausted culture too. And while "Social Media" means we have more "friends" and acquaintances than ever, we are deeply disconnected from one another. Like ships passing in the night...

As I thought about Cultivating Love, my mind wandered back to the 1990's when I first moved to Belarus as young 22-yearold to work in Christian student ministry among college-aged youth. My landlord there was a Baptist pastor and a great mentor to our diverse, multi-national team. One of the things he



said has stuck with me for all these years – I have quoted it to some of our seminarians recently, in fact – "What I wish you young people, especially you westerners coming as missionaries, could do is lengthen your expectations. You don't need to lower them – but you do need to stretch them out. Meaningful ministry takes much longer than you think. And we need you not to burn out but stick it out for the long haul." Essentially he was saying, "SLOW DOWN! Ministry is a marathon, not a sprint."

That is true not just in ministry, but in all of our lives as disciples. Lofty goals and big dreams are wonderful – but slow down and don't burn out. And how especially true it is in our relationships – with God, with our families, with our friends, with ourselves, with strangers among us?! Slow down, lengthen your expectations. It takes time to cultivate good and lasting things – and it's worth it. So perhaps this winter – or, as we anticipate Lent coming in March – you might join me in remembering that slowness can be a gift, a great character trait. Look for things that you can let go of in order to create margin, time, space for cultivating love. Slow, deliberate, intentional love.

Worship with us on TV or via Internet Livestream




Our 9:00 AM worship service is broadcast live on television every Sunday on Cox Channel 13. You can also livestream the service right from your computer on our church

The 20th Anniversary of Alternative Gifts is a Success!

At the start of Advent, we asked a simple question: "How can we focus on the true meaning of Christmas this year?" You responded with such generosity: \$8,675 worth of gifts

were donated to serve those in need here at home and around the world through the Alternative Gift program. This year your generosity bought 580 chicks, 21 fruit trees, 24 hives of honeybees, 18 pigs, 32 goats, and 1 cow (thanks to the Sunday School "noisy offering"). Fortyfive children around the world received school supplies, 15 orphans were fed, and so much more. Additionally, vou supported our neighbors in need right here at home through your gifts to the pantry, the clinic, Omaha Bridges Out of Poverty and by contributing to the emergency fund for our Afghan Refugee Family. If we look back on all we've accomplished since the start of the Alternative Gifts program at Kountze in 2004, the numbers are even more astounding: over \$204,000 in gifts have been given. Thank you for your generosity, and thank you for sharing gifts that represent the true meaning of Christmas.

As mentioned during forum, Donna Moessner will be leading the Alternative Gift program moving forward. This year her innovation was bringing in Global Mamas – please see that article for more details. Thank you, Donna for agreeing to take the reins of Alternative Gifts at Kountze!

Global Mamas: A New Alternative Gifts By Donna Moessner

Thank you dear congregation for your support of our new Alternative

Gifts, fair trade organization, Global Mamas. Founded in 2003, people world-wide work together with the mission of creating prosperity for African women and their families in Ghana, West Africa. Our tables were filled with hand batiked textiles (home décor and accessories), recycled glass beads (jewelry and ornaments) and shea butter (shea butter cream and shea butter soap). All items are hand-crafted using traditional techniques.

(I recommend you go to GlobalMamas.org to see them making these items.) Our sales totaled \$3,487 all of which goes to the Mamas.

NEWS & Notes...



The Kountze Memorial Lutheran Church Council Meeting was called to order by Pastor Wynard at 6:02 PM.

Lara McCormick led the devotions - Chapter 5 Faithful Innovations as a Way of Life for the Church, from the book, *Leading Faithful Innovation*.

The agenda was unanimously approved.

The November 19, 2024, Council meeting minutes were approved as amended. The minutes were amended to add Jacob Rump to those in attendance.

Old Business:

Pastor Wynard informed the Council that a Call Committee had been formed. Tarna Kidder has agreed to chair this committee.

The Synod has received Kountze's MSP and has approved it.

Pastor Wynard also reported that on January 26, 2025, Pastor Greg Berger, assistant to the Bishop, will preach the sermon and lead the adult forum. Pastor Berger will provide information regarding the call process and answer any questions.

Tim Backora reported that the Stewardship Committee continues to collect pledge cards. The total number of cards received will be available in January.

Budget:

Tim Backora shared a handout with the multiple budget and expense categories that are currently being used and where these categories are proposed to be reflected in Realm, the new software system, in 2025.

Training for the church staff on the Realm software will take place in January and February 2025. Training for some lay leaders may take place at a later date.

New Business:

Pastor Wynard reported that new member classes will be held on January 12 and 26, 2025. Tina Broeckemeier, Jennifer Bunge, and Jerry Fischer will attend these sessions as Council representatives.

On February 2, 2025, the budget for 2025 will be made available to the congregation.

On February 9, 2025, the annual reports will be distributed.

On February 16, 2025, the annual congregational meeting will be held during the forum.

Committee reports are due January 12-19, 2025. Ministry area leaders will inform the committees in each area when

the reports are due. The reports are to be submitted to Debbie Bogue.

Pastor Wynard informed the Council that Joseph Daffer applied to Wartburg Seminary and was accepted. The Synod has asked Kountze whether we will provide prayer and support for him. The Council approved the motion for Pastor Wynard to fill out the Synod form demonstrating our support for Mr. Daffer.

This application led to a discussion about the support students receive from Kountze. It was decided that the Scholarship Committee would meet and bring a proposal to the Council.

Finance Committee Report:

Tim Backora reported that the November donations were \$65,000 with expenses of \$91,000 for November 2024. For the year, the deficit is \$114,000.

Year-to-date expenses are \$977,000. The expenses are \$9,000 more than one year ago. However, one year ago our giving totaled \$867,000. In comparison, this year's general fund number is \$773,000.

Because of the deficit, many possible solutions were discussed. It was agreed that the church's present financial status should be further conveyed to the congregation.

Staff Reports:

Pastor Wynard will be on vacation in January and will not attend the next Council meeting.

The Property Committee requested that the Council review the proposal for the Douglas Street electronic sign which will cost \$48,525. The Council approved the project and asked that the Property Committee forward the request to Endowment.

Sunday School attendance is up an average of 15 individuals.

All other staff reports were accepted.

On January 5, 2025, a youth mission trip talk will be led by Mia Valquier.

The meeting adjourned at 7:56 PM.

Alternative Gifts raised an amazing \$807 to support this partnership.

Born from a mission at Kountze Memorial Lutheran Church, where it initially operated within Sunday school


classrooms, the HGFC has evolved into an independent 501(c)(3) nonprofit now housed at the Kountze Commons Community Outreach Center.
