Compassion & Courage, Not Controversy

We live in such a divided and hostile world. It's exhausting, isn't it – this ugly, mean society we seem to be surrounded by these days. And I know we all want church to be a sanctuary from the bitter divisiveness! Don't you long for community that's different?! For places and people you know you can trust to care for you and those you love? For spaces where you don't have to be anxious that someone might say or do something offensive – or accuse you of being offensive? For an emphasis on what builds up, encourages, and unites us in faith?

"So, Pastor, why do you keep referencing things you know are divisive and hurtful to some people?"

I know we don't all feel exactly that way – and the sentiments above may not be worded perfectly. But I hope you'll recognize what I'm trying to get at. There are definitely folks here at Kountze Memorial – and not just one or two – who are at times frustrated that sermons or our prayers of intercession or the ELCA nationally or the Nebraska Synod go too far, express what might be seen as political or biased views, fall into the traps of unhelpful stereotypes or activism. There are others – and not just one or two – who are frustrated at times that we don't speak out more about things happening in the world around us, that we aren't more engaged in living out our faith. So what do we do? How do we navigate what it means to be church together in this current reality?

These are oh-so-real questions that pastors, lay leaders, and folks in the pews have to struggle with these days! Believe me – I have been kept awake at night more times than I can probably count wondering whether I'm saying the wrong things, or not saying the right things. Whether I've crossed a line in one direction or the other; whether I'm truly listening and following God or simply inserting my own opinions and bias.

I'd like us to talk about it. Not about the *issues* – though I do hope we might get to the point where we could have healthy, constructive conversation with one another about things that matter to each other: LGBTQ inclusion

in the church and society; treatment of immigrants, ethnic and cultural minorities, etc.; how we best show care and come alongside the poor, the mentally and physically ill, the homeless, the prisoners, the abused – those whom Jesus showed compassion for. But before we talk about things like that, I'd like us to talk about WHY I think we should talk about them, and how. Not because I want to push an agenda, but because I deeply believe it's what God wants – precisely because God wants us to be a community, a church, that belongs to God, where all parts of the body are treated with dignity and compassion.

Because here's the thing – we cannot be a place that builds up, that encourages and unites us in faith, a place where folks feel confident they can come and experience the love of Christ, if we are a place that avoids talking about hard, controversial issues. Why? Because for so many people among us these are not simply issues, they are life realities. So if we are not a community where someone can say, "My child just came out to me as queer - what do I do? How do I handle these hard, roller-coaster emotions I'm feeling?" and know that they won't be met with awkward silence and averted eyes, we are not a safe place of compassion and support for that person. How can we be that sanctuary community if someone can't come and say, "My brother is an alcoholic, and I think he's abusing his wife. I love them both, but I'm so angry and sad and I feel helpless. What do I do?" If someone can't come and say, "I messed up so badly - I might lose my job. And my family. I need help."

All of those are incredibly difficult, uncomfortable, painful conversations. They are things none of us have the "right" answers to. They are complex, and sensitive, and oh so hard. But I long for Kountze Memorial to be a place where people know they can come as they are, and where they find that the words and actions we do offer can bring healing and peace – God's unconditional love and grace. People who will look them in the eye, treat them with dignity, and love them. Because these are not just hypothetical "issues" – they are realities in the lives of people in our community.

I believe that the Bible gives us guidance about how to be a place that can talk about those hard, complex, sensitive things – even when we don't always agree or see

Worship with us on TV or via Internet Livestream




Our 9:00 AM worship service is broadcast live on television every Sunday on Cox Channel 13. You can also livestream the service right from your computer on our church

eye to eye. Of course we don't! The world is a complex and broken place. But I do think the Holy Spirit can shape us to be a courageous and compassionate people of God. A community that is clear on what unites us in a way that gives us the capacity to bear the awkward discomfort and pain of hard conversations. A community that sticks with one another when "the issues" become our issues, so that no one feels alone. Because we are one body in Christ Jesus. Because we have been forgiven and lavished with God's grace, and that's exactly what we extend to those around us.

A newsletter article is nowhere near sufficient or appropriate to delve into the how and why and what-abouts of this topic – for one, because it's not a conversation, it's simply me writing to you. So I am asking you to gather with me during a Forum time in June to talk about these questions of how and why and what it looks like to be God's church in this divided age. How do we do that in a way that honors God and produces in us the fruits of the Spirit (love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control)? Please join us at around 10:15 on June 22 in the Fellowship Hall. We'll talk together about:

- A biblical approach to difficult conversations.
- What does it look like to treat each other with dignity and compassion especially when we disagree?
- How much disagreement can we and should we tolerate in our community? How do we do that, practically?
- What are the essentials that unite us?

And a standing invitation: If I say or do something that makes you angry, leaves you confused, hurts or offends you – please, would you reach out and set up a time to speak with me? For my part, I promise to listen and be open to how God might speak through you. Thank you!

NEWS & Notes...



Pastor Wynard called the meeting to order at 6:05 PM. Jerry Fischer led the devotions.

The agenda and the minutes of the Kountze Memorial Lutheran Church Congregational Council Meeting held on March 18, 2025, were accepted as presented.

The financial report was presented by Tim Backora. He reported that total revenue was around \$89,000, expenses were \$109,000 for March 2025, with a year-to-date balance of \$39,000. April has been a good month so far. The allocations approved from deFreese Manor and undesignated memorials will be transferred to Cambridge Advisors. In preparation for the moving of these funds, Noni identified \$50,000 of the undesignated memorials were memorials to support music. The Vision Fund currently has a balance of \$378,500. All remaining funds are unchanged. The transfer of funds to Cambridge Financial was approved.

The Your Mission Trip Fund has \$18,000 in the checking account, which are funds left over from the youth mission trip that was canceled due to COVID.

The TV Media Fund currently has a balance of approximately \$100,000. Due to this balance, there may not be a need to request support from the Endowment to support the TV Media this year.

Realm Training for staff and council members will start sometime in June 2025.

OLD BUSINESS

The call process with Deacon Korra was discussed in detail. The assessment was that everything was done correctly and that the decision was probably the correct one. The call process continues to move forward.

NEW BUSINESS

The Scholarship Committee usually allocates 5% of the available funds to support scholarships. Per Tim Backora, the Scholarship Committee may come back to the Council to request using up to 10% of the available funds to support a seminarian if the need is presented.

The Scholarship Committee recommended a total of \$6,286 be awarded to 5 college students and one Seminarian. The Scholarship Committee's recommendations were accepted.

The staff Reports were accepted as presented.

Faith Formation

• Kristin Boe is coordinating volunteer service Fridays for middle schoolers during the summer, who will be doing different projects around the church.

Membership Committee

- The new member classes will be held on April 27 and May 4. New members will be received on May 18.
- The Neighborhood Gathering will be the first weekend in May, which is earlier than it has been.
- Bruce Nissen reported that the Archives Committee is missing confirmation class pictures for three years. He will follow up with Pastor Wynard after Easter.

Community Engagement

• Phil Meyer has agreed to be the coordinator for the Kountze Community Garden.

Worship/Music

• The next meeting will be held on May 8, 2025.

Property/KETV

 The last scheduled meetings for the Property and KETV Committees were canceled due to a funeral held at the church.

Leadership

- The Personnel Committee will meet in the upcoming weeks.
- There was a lengthy discussion regarding the changes occurring at the Love Thy Neighbor Food Pantry and what we are trying to improve in what we can offer.
- There are three confirmation members this year. Next year's class will be larger.
- There was a discussion regarding the planning for a Youth Director.

The meeting adjourned with the Lord's Prayer. The next meeting will be held on May 20, 2025, at 6:00 PM.

Switch in Bible Translation

Beginning this summer, if you're paying very close attention, you might notice a few changes in worship around the reading of Scripture. That is because **we are making the switch from using the New Revised Standard Version (NRSV) of the bible to the NRSV Updated Edition (NRSVue).**The switch doesn't come at our initiative but because the publisher of

The switch doesn't come at our initiative but because the publisher of these editions, Friendship Press, is withdrawing the authorization for other publishers to distribute the NRSV in either print or digital form. So we will no longer be able to get the NRSV online to use in our bulletins, etc. or buy new bibles or other resources with the NRSV.

Why publish a new update to the bible? There are two primary reasons for any new bible translation: first, language is always changing and so translating the ancient text into modern language must be a regular, periodic exercise; second, new discoveries of ancient manuscripts come to light that add to the library of sources that inform translators about what the original texts said. Since the first publication of the NRSV, hundreds of such manuscripts have come to light.

What does it mean for us at Kountze Memorial? Most of the time you probably wouldn't even notice. Much of the NRSVue is virtually the same as the NRSV. But occasionally you may hear passages that strike you as quite different than what you remember them being. Our lectors and lay worship leaders will notice the change from using lectionary books to printed Scripture passages – that is because the ritual lectionary books we use are not yet available in the NRSVue. We are keeping an eye out and may well purchase those resources when they become available. In the meantime, if you are interested in learning more about the NRSVue and downloading an example of some of the passages that have been updated, you can check out this website:



Broken Harbor is the fourth novel in the series of psychological thrillers written by French. The novel is set in a neighborhood in Brianstown, originally named Broken Harbor. Patrick Swain and his two children have been murdered and his wife seriously injured after an attack in their home during the middle of the night. Mick "Scorcher" Kennedy, with a new detective in the agency, have been assigned to the case. Mick thinks it will be an easy case to solve, but as French's novels evolve, many turns take place in solving the case. Childhood memories of this neighborhood for "Scorcher" and his sister enter into solving the crime.



James is the novel by award winning and Pulitzer Prize author Percival Everett. The novel is the retelling of Mark Twain's story of Huckelberry Finn from the perspective of character, Jim. Jim is an enslaved man who learns he is to be sold. In order to save his

wife and daughter, he escapes to Jackson Island where he meets Huck who is escaping his abusive father, and they embark on a dangerous, adventurous voyage down the Mississippi River.

Key points of the novel are the horrible effects of slavery, the intelligence of Jim since he could read and write, family loyalty, and importance of language. Everett gives a new perspective on American history and literature through the novel which may become a cornerstone of twenty-first century literature.
